6 (BOYS) TRAINING REGIMENT, ROYAL SIGNALS

Are you interested in radio? In telegraphy? In cars or motor-cycles? And do you want a live, well-paid job, beginning as soon as you leave school and leading to a fine career? If so, you should think seriously about joining the Boys' Training Regiment of the Royal Signals. Going into Royal Signals through the Boys' Training Regiment gives you a tremendous advantage over the man who enlists straight from civilian life. This leaflet tells you about it and explains what you have to do to get in.



You can join at the end of the school term in which you reach school-leaving age. You enlist to serve until you are 18, and then for 6 years with the Colours and 3 years in the Reserve. You can, if you wish, go on until you qualify for a pension.

Health


You must be medically fit, at least 4 ft. 7 in. in height, and not less than 5 st. 4 lb. in weight.

Training


After joining the Boys' Training Regiment you will be trained at Beverley, Yorkshire. Here the object is to train boys up to a military and educational standard which will enable them to master the highest grades of Signal trades. In addition, your training as a Regimental Boy will fit you for early promotion.

Off duty

At Beverley there are organized games at least twice a week. You can take part in, or learn, any kind of sport or game; the necessary kit is provided free. There is a good library, a quiet

room where you can read or write letters, and facilities for many hobbies, including a carpenter's shop. There are also films, dances, and trips to the seaside. Religious training and the opportunity to go to church are not forgotten.

Pay

ON ENLISTMENT ... 2s. 6d. a day
AFTER 1 YEAR'S SERVICE 3s. 6d. a day
AFTER 2 YEARS' SERVICE 4s. 0d. a day
AT 17½ YEARS OLD ... 7s. 0d. a day

Also, when you are on leave you receive a daily ration allowance.

Leave

There is a generous allowance of leave each year on full pay. Part of it is at Christmas, part at Easter and part in the summer. Free travel warrants are provided each time.

Cost

It all costs you and your parents nothing, and you get good food and plenty of it, a complete issue of clothes (including shirts, underclothes and pyjamas) and bedding.

How to join

You can enlist at any Army Recruiting Office, provided you are a British subject residing in the United Kingdom. All you need are certificates of good character from two responsible people (your headmaster and doctor will do).
